Spring Ohigan – Paramita Day

“Higan” is a Japanese term which means “the Other Shore” (of Enlightenment). *Higan* is commonly called “*Ohigan*” with a Japanese honorific prefix “O.” *Ohigan* is observed twice a year on spring and fall equinox days. The weather is comfortable during this time of year. Japanese often say that “*Atsusa Samusamo Higan-made*” or “The hot or cold weather will remain until *Higan*.” Thereafter, the weather will change to either warm/hot or cool/cold. Thus, *Ohigan* is an ideal season to reflect upon ourselves and also the Other Shore of Enlightenment.

“*Ohigan*” is the Japanese term for Sanskrit “*Paramita*,” which means “leading to the Other Shore,” and it also means “Perfection.” Buddhism sets up a practice of “the Six Kinds of Perfection (*Paramita*)” to lead us to Enlightenment. They are:

1. *Dana* (Giving)
2. *Sila* (Precepts)
3. *Ksanti* (Perseverance)
4. *Virya* (Effort)
5. *Dhyana* (Meditation)
6. *Prajna* (Wisdom)

By fulfilling these Six Kinds of Perfection (*Paramita*), Buddhism teaches that we are able to reach the Other Shore of the Buddha, the World of Enlightenment. The World of the Buddha is described in **The Small Sukhavativyuha Sutra** as follows:

From here to the direction of the west, beyond 10 billion Buddha-lands, there is a world called Utmost Happiness (Sukhavati or Gakuraku). In that land there is a Buddha named Infinite (Amitayus or Amida). He is now, at present, preaching the Dharma.

This geographical description of the world of the Buddha may not be acceptable with our modern knowledge. But we know that it is very difficult, almost impossible, for ordinary people to reach the Other Shore of the Buddha by fulfilling the Six Kinds of Perfection. Shinran Shonin, the founder of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, taught us that even though we cannot reach the Other Shore of Enlightenment by fulfilling these Six Kinds of Perfection, Amida Buddha is now preaching the Dharma and he is extending his primal Vow of the Great Compassion and Wisdom to all of us. He stated in **The Hymns of the Patriarchs** as follows:

*Boundless is the painful ocean of Samsara (birth-and-death)
Wherein have we been long struggling,
Only the ship of Amida Buddha’s Primal Vow
Carries us unfailingly across the ocean.*

“*Ohigan*” is not a distant Other Shore of Enlightenment for Nembutsu followers because Amida Buddha’s compassionate light is always casting upon us. According to the Jodo Shinshu tradition, “*Ohigan*” is also called “*Sanbutsu-e*” or “Gathering of Praising the Buddha.” Let us all gather together during *Ohigan* to praise Amida Buddha’s Wisdom and Compassion which lead all of us to the Other Shore of Enlightenment and appreciate Utmost Happiness in the Nembutsu, Namo Amida Butsu.

The theme of the event, "Coming Home to the Nembutsu" was praised as the most fitting by many speakers and others. Many attendees eagerly participated in the activities and programs the committee put together, sharing the learning and experiencing together the true meaning of "Coming Home to the Nembutsu". I'd like to express my deep gratitude to those who attended the convention and gave support in various ways.

BCA Ministers Association and National Council Meeting will be held in Portland, Oregon from February 26 through March 1. Some of the items of importance to us such as BCA budget, the Jodo Shinshu Center and the

options for financing of the debt will be discussed. We will report to you when our representatives are back.

In Gassho, Mas Tahara

WIDE AWAKE TO AMIDA from Mandarava Blossoms Volume 10 Number 7 March, 1980

“The gods of heaven and earth bow to followers of the way of Faith in Amida” – Tannisho

What does it mean to have the deep mind of Faith? Do we work hard to get it? Is it a Gift? How do we happen to deserve such a Gift of Faith?

We really ought to give serious thought to the above questions, in order not to deceive ourselves.

To have a heart of Faith in this instance means to rely wholeheartedly upon the Power of the Nembutsu, which is the Holy Name of Amida Buddha, through Compassion of Amida. This means then that we no longer count our so called "good deeds" as having brought us to a full reliance of Amida. Nor does it mean that our hearts are quaking over our so called "evil deeds". Of course we will bear the fruit of evil deeds and reap the karmic results of them as we go about our daily lives and we can't just fool ourselves into doing anything we want, while pretending to hide under the mantle of Amida Buddha's Compassion. It goes beyond all that.

When one has experienced the total lack of success in living and believing, yet still deeply wants to know Amida Buddha and would give anything in the world to have faith...and is more than willing to give up his own ways, without wavering from day to day, then the Compassion of Amida overtakes that one and the Gift is realized. This

definitely means it was not from good deeds, (though those who try to live the Bodhisattva ideal, ought to continue, as it is the only right thing to do for the sake of our fellow man) and no pride need enter into the picture, rather a profound humility.

To have a deep heart of Faith, as given by Amida, means that our lives take on an entirely new dimension. Humbleness. Sincerity of heart. Thankfulness. An unwavering heart.

To have a deep faith, as given by Amida means that henceforth the person with such a heart will be able to truly be thankful and express his thankfulness by his thoughts, words and actions. Such a one is single hearted. It doesn't mean he will never experience some measure of trouble or suffering...this comes to all.

It does mean that the devotee of the Nembutsu is better able to take it in stride, to handle his problems and though he may fall in one way or another, he will get up again and rely more upon the Power of the Nembutsu.

Our only share in all of this gift, is that we did sincerely want IT and since we did want IT so earnestly, IT became ours.

It is to be remembered that when one repeats Namu Amida Butsu, it is not from our strength, or goodness or merit, it is being said by Amida, using our lips and voice.

So, when the gods of heaven and earth bow to followers of Faith, they are actually bowing before Amida Buddha.

Special thanks go to Lynn Goodrich and her family for organizing the recycling and composting of the waste from the potluck also to those who took home compostable bags of waste. Thanks for helping us go green!

Classroom Reports

PreK/K class-teachers Marie Kosai-Luke, Joan Nakano, Kari Ann Yokoyama and Joyce Kato The Pre-K/K class welcomed the New Year by making a miniature *okasane* and learning of its significance. They also learned about *osechi-ryori* or Japanese New Year food and what each food represents. Then the students made their own kid-friendly version of *osechi-ryori*.

Ho-onko was observed in the classroom as students learned about the life of Shinran Shonin. They made a snowflake collage depicting the story of Shinran seeking shelter in a snowstorm and colored a story book about his life to take home to share with their parents.

The class learned that the Buddha taught that to like ourselves and to be liked by others, we must practice the Eight-fold Path. They discussed each aspect of the path and decorated their own Wheel of Dharma with Amida Buddha at the center.

Students observed Nirvana Day by decorating a picture of the Buddha upon his death.

1st/2nd grade-teachers Dave Scattergood and Joyce Tsuji To start off the New Year we colored year of the mouse/rat calendars. The students then did a *Hoonko* word search and listened to the story of the 3 Little Wolves and the Big Bad Pig, a twist on an old favorite. After that they designed some interesting homes. The

class followed Sensei's lead and made paper *daruma* dolls to remind us of our resolutions for the year. We then put together a paper *onenju* where students contributed their own bead, which we have put up in the classroom. Finally we worked together to complete a Nirvana Day puzzle and a mouse made of heart shapes.

3rd grade—teachers Susie Taketa and Julianne Tosaya We continue to learn that you can experience the Dharma everywhere, including while making cookies. Each student was given a bag of different ingredients to mix together to bake cookies. We learned that we couldn't have made cookies without everyone else in the class. “Introduction to the *Shoshinge*” Course With Reverend Don Castro

Tuesdays, March 4, 11, 18, 25, and April 1, 8, 15, 22, 2008 7:00 p.m. – 8:30 p.m.

This 8 week course will present both an introduction to the meaning and practice in chanting the Shoshin Nembutsu Ge or “Gatha on the True Faith in the Nembutsu.” This gatha serves as an outline of Shinran’s teaching and is one of only two of the chants in our service book with the actual writing of Shinran Shonin. Each of the eight weeks, we will explore the meaning of the text and practice chanting and conducting a simple service. This course is intended to lead up to a new Sunday morning service beginning in May. This service will be held from 8:45 – 9:30 a.m. most Sundays and will be modeled after a very successful service Orange County Buddhist Church as initiated. A background of Jodo Shinshu is recommended.
