Four Important Events in Shakyamuni Buddha's Life And Four Kinds of Nirvana

- I. Prince Siddhartha's Birth
- II. Enlightenment at 35
- III. Wheel of the Dharma in Motion
- IV. Shakyamuni's Death at 80

1. *Originally Pure Nirvana*
2. *Nirvana with a residue*
3. *Nirvana without a residue (Pari-Nirvana)*
4. *No-abiding Nirvana*

In Shakyamuni Buddha's life, I find four important events. The first important event is his birth. He was born as Prince of Kapilavastu in the Lumbini Flower Garden in India on April 8th over 2500 years ago in India. His father, King Suddhodana, named him Siddhartha, which means "Fulfillment of One's Wishes." According to Shinran Shonin, founder of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, the birth of Prince Siddhartha was considered a manifestation of Amida Buddha in order to lead the ordinary people to attain Nirvana.

Renouncing his royal life at 29, Siddhartha attained Nirvana by extinguishing all illusions (klesa) and became the Buddha at 35 under the Bodhi tree in Buddhagaya. This Nirvana is called "**Nirvana with a residue.**" This is the second important event.

As the Buddha, the Compassionate One, he began to preach the Dharma to others. His first talk became known as "the Wheel of the Dharma in Motion for the First Time." His decision to preach the Dharma gave us all opportunities to listen to the teaching of the Buddha. This first sermon of Shakyamuni Buddha is the third important event in his life.

After 45 years of propagation, he died/entered into Nirvana on February 15th at the age of 80. This is the fourth important event in his life and this Nirvana is called "**Pari-Nirvana**" or "**Nirvana without a residue.**"

When Shakyamuni Buddha was near death, he addressed the Sangha (assembly) saying, "It may

be that some of you will think, 'the word of The Teacher is a thing of the past; we now have no Teacher.' But this is not the correct view. The Dharma which I have taught and enjoyed upon you is to be your teacher when I am gone." Thus, the Dharma became the guiding light of all Buddhists after Shakyamuni Buddha passed away.

The Mahayana Buddhists categorized Nirvana into four kinds. The first kind is **Originally Pure Nirvana**. This shows that the nature of Nirvana is originally pure and it refers to the Tathata (Thus-ness or Such-ness). The essence of this Nirvana is same with the enlightenment.

The second kind is **Nirvana with a residue**. This refers to the person who attained Nirvana by destroying all illusion (klesa), but still possesses a physical body. The third kind is **Pari-Nirvana** or **Nirvana without a residue**. This refers to Nirvana of one who no longer possesses a physical body. The fourth kind is **No-abiding Nirvana**. This refers to the perfect enlightenment, which does not dwell in quiescence, but actively works for the benefit of all sentient beings as the compassionate Buddha.

Amida Buddha as the compassionate Buddha is always acting everywhere for the benefit of all of us to attain Nirvana. We will be awakened to the great compassion of Amida Buddha by listening to the Dharma as our guiding light, the teacher. No-abiding Nirvana reminds us that we are all living in the compassion of Amida Buddha. Gassho

Does a Dog Have Buddha Nature? by Rev. Don Castro

In February, we observe Nirvana Day/ Pet's Memorial Service. At first glance, it might seem odd to link these two memorial observances but one of the wonderful characteristics of Buddhism is that it regards all life as sacred. Buddhism also attributes various kinds of intelligence to animals. In one Tibetan text I recall reading that, if we could but understand them, even the birds are preaching the Dharma.



I am fascinated by how early in Buddhist history animals are graphically shown worshipping the Buddha. At the ancient Buddhist monastery at Sanchi, India, many animals are depicted worshipping the Bodhi tree. Ancient Japanese artists, in picturing the Buddha's final instructions to his disciples on his death bed, also charmingly included many kinds of animals gathered around mourning the loss of their

beloved teacher from this world.

I believe animals have various kinds of intelligence of various levels of sophistication. I certainly admire many of their traits – I wish I could “cat nap,” for instance. Mostly, from my pets I have learned how dull witted I am: I didn't hear that person approaching the front door! I didn't smell that...I-don't-want-to-know!

Buddhists don't regard animals as having been put on earth by God in order to be a food source for man. And what about the belief that God is pleased by animal sacrifices? Such beliefs must surely account for the fact that few, if any, animals have any faith in God.

Animals are our teachers so, on Nirvana Day, it is perfectly appropriate that we honor our pets who taught us so much, maybe not with words but, like the Buddha, primarily by example.

Message to Our Members by Mas Tahara

Wasn't it a great New Year's party on January 11? We appreciate so many members - young and old, helping in planning, preparing and working together on all the functions that needed to be done. The installation ceremony of officers signaled the beginning of many programs and activities that the temple and its affiliated organizations will be involved with together with all of you members.

However, I must add, it is not going to be a “business as usual” year since we must face some cold realities of hardships in many areas of our operations. Some changes must be made.

As I mentioned in my message at the party, the Betsuin Board of Directors has been busy in truly understanding what our temple can and should do to cope with the challenges we must face. Dealing with declining membership is one of the major tasks along with the advancing age of our membership (those over 70 years are more than the younger



members). Another serious issue is the deteriorating conditions of the temple buildings and facilities. The financial outlook, having a deficit of over \$100,000 each year, is yet another area that needs some strong remedial actions. The Board will tackle these issues and more, very soon, and come up with some action plans. We plan to inform you well enough to work together to keep our temple the place to “Embrace True and Real Life of Nembutsu”.

Just a brief note to thank everyone for asking about my wife Anna's condition. She is no longer getting out-patient rehabilitation therapy since she has sufficiently recovered from the stroke she suffered last October. She has not returned to her swimming routine yet, and is still hesitant to drive; but, otherwise, she is back to normal. I, too, am back after taking a leave of absence for the last two months. We appreciate very much the overwhelming support you all have given both of us.

Notes on Dharma Exchange...December 28, 2008, January 4, 18, 2009

These notes are intended for those who were unable to attend Dharma Exchange -- Japanese service attendees, committee members, Dharma School parents.

On December 28 Joe Schwab, Minister's Assistant, continued Castro sensei's commentary on "*dhukka*," and cited the story of New York shoppers rushing through a door and trampling to death the employee who opened the door. He also addressed the 50 billion dollar scam perpetrated by Mr. Bernard Madoff. Both are examples of *dhukka* relating to desire.

How we handle desire is the important thing, not the desire itself. Rev. Julie Hanada asked, "What causes desire?" She agreed with a participant that fear and mortality are at the basis of greed. Greed can be traced back to pre-history when it was necessary for survival to accumulate food. Out-of-control desire equals greed and the question today is where to draw the line. Gassho, Pat Bobrow

On January 4, 2009 Rev. Julie Hanada took the lead by asking the question, "How do we learn or teach gratitude?" Some participants offered the answers – awareness, curiosity, action. Jim Sensei asked, "How many are afraid to do good deeds?" after citing the example of a resident snow plowing his neighborhood streets and was told to stop because he had no authority to do it. Rev. Julie offered, "Don't let another's poison, poison you." and "How do we listen? Hear the Dharma everyday." She mentioned the movie, *Gran Torino*, as an example of the power of role modeling. Jim Sensei said we teach with our "backs"- that is, by example.

After next week's Dharma Exchange an added informal discussion and an extension of Dharma Exchange will take place after 11:30 for those who want to go beyond coffee and donuts.

Paul Mori urgently asked for volunteers to sign up to take their turn (*toban*) for acquiring donuts/coffee, set-up/clean-up of Dharma Exchange's coffee/refreshment duty.

On January 18, 2009 during his Dharma Talk Rev. Castro expressed his sense that *nembutsu* is an expression of sincere gratitude. At Dharma Exchange he related that for himself the Christian idea of Jesus dying for our sins projected a sense of agony; whereas, Buddhism presents a peaceful, poised image. In response to questions, he made comments on sages: that they practice with the goal of enlightenment; but "no matter how much I try, I cannot" - this is self-power; on Zen masters: lineage of teachers is important; on Tendai Buddhism: it includes an eclectic form of Zen; on Amida: it is awakening to something beyond ourselves.
