WHEN OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS

Our Betsuin Religious Dept. held a “retreat” in mid-August which, in reality, was a 4 hour long brainstorming and prioritizing session. In my upcoming newsletter articles, I will present and discuss the Five Objectives for 2010-2011 that came out of the retreat. Many ideas were aired and I deeply appreciate all the concern and support I received for being the only minister here at the Betsuin now that Rinban Matsubayashi has retired. I have twice been the only minister at our Betsuin, each time for 9 months, before Rinban Fujii came and before Rinban Matsubayashi arrived. The second period of 9 months was particularly stressful because there was an extraordinary number of funerals and services in Eastern Washington. Today, I am happy to announce that we have two individuals, Paul Vielle and Christine Marr, who will receive Tokudo ordination this October and who are taking increasing responsibility for the religious-educational program in the eastern part of our state.

Today, the ministerial situation here is quite different from what it was when I was alone 5 years ago. This is largely due to the progress (locally and nationally) that has been made in the development of the Minister’s Assistant and Youth Minister’s Assistant programs. We still have a long way to go and a lot of details to work out but, with our MA’s and our Youth MA’s, and our commitment to a strong Japanese language program, I feel confident that we can maintain and nurture a wonderful Nembutsu spirit in a growing and diverse Sangha.

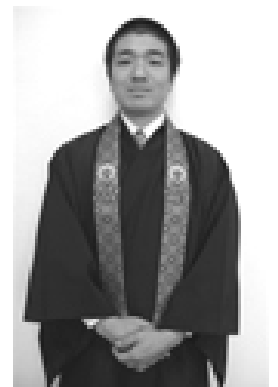
The key to a vibrant and diverse religious-educational program is the creation of an ever-larger body of confident, capable teacher-students; teacher in the sense of sharing the Dharma and student in the sense of humility and lifelong learning. For years, I have used the simile of the minister being like a horse pulling a cart (the cart being the Sangha). This is pretty much the model we have inherited from Japan. As the cart slows down (loss of membership, etc.), the horse is the one held responsible. In fact, the solution is to get more people out of the cart to help pull. Then the lead horse can retire to Tahiti...just kidding!

One of the Five Objectives for 2010-2011 that was set by our Religious Dept. in the retreat is to have 20 Minister’s Assistants by the end of next year. Considering we currently have 4 Minister’s Assistants and 8 Youth Minister’s Assistants, we need more “Dharma Horses” to help pull the Sangha cart. All you have to do is talk with our MA’s who have attended MAPS Quest seminars (that’s Minister’s Assistant Program Seminar) or our youth who have attended Youth Advocacy Committee retreats and reunions to see how much they have enjoyed and benefitted from these programs. There is a traditional term in Buddhism that means “Dharma Enjoyment” (Hou-Raku in Japanese). To immerse oneself in the Dharma is a wonderful and joyous opportunity. When opportunity knocks, don’t slam the door!

From the Religious Department – Monpo Seminar September 11

On September 11, 2010 from 1:00 PM to 5:00 PM we will have Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara as guest speaker for the Monpo Seminar. He is fluent in both English and Japanese and will be the guest speaker for the Sunday Ohigan Service. Reverend Kuwahara who was born in Hiroshima, Japan in 1975 is currently the coordinator for the Jodo Shinshu Correspondence Course and coordinator for the International Ministerial Orientation Program. Large and Small Things You Can Do To Save Our Planet by Gail Kaminishi

When going through your fall wardrobe, you might find moth holes in your woolens. If you don't choose to have them rewoven, cut them up into squares. You can sew throws and blankets, scarves, totes, etc. out of various pieces of wool for attractive mementos of your wardrobe. The same goes for sweaters and clothing in general.

It is said that paper grocery bags take 4 times as much energy to make as plastic bags, so they are not necessarily better than plastic. Always keep re-usable bags in your car, including small bags for produce. Use only for produce and not for meat (to avoid cross contamination.)

The use of bamboo is a sound move, in that bamboo is sustainable (easily grown, less energy to harvest, etc.). You can find bamboo in clothing, building materials, flooring, kitchenware, and in lots of other products.

By the Numbers: Thanks to your generous gifts and pledges, the campaign has raised over \$300,000 in 2010. The appeal for Shinran Shonin 750th Memorial held in Feb. in San Jose raised over \$140,000 for the Jodo Shinshu Center in Berkeley, CA.

Notes on Dharma Exchange Dharma Exchange takes place from 11:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. after Sunday Service in the dining room. All are welcome to attend this opportunity for discussion and questions typically led by Reverend Castro, Reverend Warrick, or Minister's Assistant Joe Schwab.

July 25 - Joe Schwab M.A. conducted The Dharma Exchange, and Rev. Warrick talked about the Dharma School plans for their trip to Japan. He will go as well. They will leave July 29 and return August 7. They anticipate 400 Japanese children at the Hongwanji. They will learn to clean the temple, explore, and find certain things in the temple. A new roof was installed on Founders Hall recently. In order to understand and respect their heritage the children went to Honzan. On Day 2 there will be a 5:30am service with confirmation ceremony conducted by Monshu Otani. They will visit many temples and friendships will be promoted through the pen pal program.

August 1, 2010 - Joe Schwab, M.A. thought he might go to Canada during the Viet Nam War, but decided he was more comfortable in Spokane, and later joined the Navy. Retired professor Akira Ichikawa indicated he went to Canada because of an academic position, not to escape the draft. Joe commented that the pilot of the Enola Gay, which dropped the first atomic bomb, was quoted as saying he never suffered sleepless nights for his participation. Joe was asked to explain the quote, *Render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's and to God that which is God's*. It is difficult to go against one's influences and training. Joe said Ram Das made sense to him on the second reading.

August 8 - Rev. Castro discussed Rennyo and that the Nishi and Higashi Hongwanjis were established 1415-1499. At age 6 his mother told him to restore the greatness of the Jodo Shinshu tradition as membership was down. He converted many to mainstream Jodo Shinshu from other forms of Buddhism. He introduced the Gobunsho, which is still recited at memorial services. Rennyo was a charismatic teacher, and placed his sons in strategic locations, forming the betsuin system, which was under his supervision. While Jodo Shinshu was under attack, Rennyo built Osaka Castle which was well fortified, and it came under attack for 10 years. The emperor interceded. Rennyo had 5 wives and 27 children, the last one born when he was 84. He died at 85. Joe commented that without Rennyo there would be no Hongwanji. A participant questioned the aspect of fear being a motivator.
